CANNON BALLS

The Cannon balls adorning the crown represent the ones which remain lodged in St Giles church. Legend has it they were fired by Oliver Cromwell's troops during the battle of Aylesbury.

There is one cannon ball for each of the Chalfont villages: St. Giles, St. Peter and Little Chalfont.



KEYS

The crossed keys symbolise the keys to the Kingdom of Heaven entrusted to Saint Peter, the namesake of Chalfont St Peter.



BUCKINGHAMSHIRE SWAN

This has been an emblem of Buckinghamshire since the time of the Anglo-Saxons, when swans were bred in the county at the request of the King. The Duke of Buckinghamshire famously wore the crest at The Battle of Agincourt.

The swan now conveys serenity and splendour; and is a regal reminder of times gone by in this most historic of counties.
